CRD and STÁUTW Sign Memorandum of Understanding

Media Release For Immediate Release May 15, 2025

Victoria, BC- The Capital Regional District (CRD) and STÁUTW (Tsawout) First Nation have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU).

STÁUTW First Nation has been a caretaker of the land on which the CRD is located since time immemorial. This MOU outlines a framework for ongoing dialogue and supports respectful, reciprocal government-to-government decision-making and service delivery that uplifts Indigenous self-determination. By implementing this MOU, the CRD will integrate STÁUTW's perspectives and wisdom into CRD's initiatives, which will enhance regional service delivery and create opportunities for collaborative economic growth and community well-being.

"It's with great honour and excitement that we, as STÁUTW First Nation, alongside the CRD, advance reconciliation in real time! I'd like to take this opportunity to say thank you to the CRD for working through and signing an MOU with STÁUTW First Nation," said STÁUTW Chief Abraham Pelkey. "Although the Local Government Act states engaging or consulting with a First Nation government isn't mandated, CRD does it anyway. We at STÁUTW value this effort and our newfound relationship, now and into the future."

"We are honoured to enter into this agreement with STÁUTW First Nation to strengthen our government-to-government relationship," said Cliff McNeil-Smith, Chair of the CRD Board. "This MOU reflects our commitment to working together in a spirit of partnership and respect, recognizing the importance of Indigenous knowledge and leadership in our shared efforts. I look forward to our ongoing collaboration."

By outlining principles for working together, this MOU will directly support the creation of new processes for respectful and reciprocal government-to-government decision-making. CRD and STÁUTW staff will collaboratively develop a workplan and hold ongoing meetings to review progress on the priority topics identified in the MOU. Additionally, annual government-to-government meetings will be held between leadership and elected representatives. These regular points of connection are important to foster continuous dialogue, build trust, and ensure that both parties remain aligned in their shared goals and commitments.

The MOU sets out priority topics for collaboration, including:

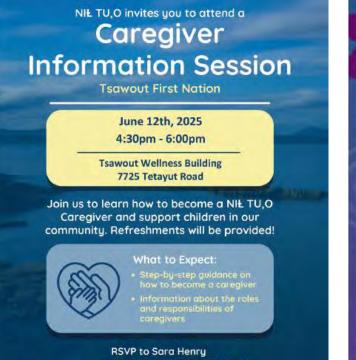
- fostering a respectful relationship;
- heritage conservation;
- reclaiming SENĆOŦEN placenames;
- · parks, protected areas, and trails;
- consultation;
- docks and foreshore stewardship;
- storm water and source control water monitoring and management;
- · land use strategies, management, and decision-making;
- environmental protection and restoration;
- · land acquisition and disposition;
- equipment and resources;
- water supply and sewage treatment infrastructure;
- · economic development and employment;
- · contribution sharing; and
- any other topics identified and agreed to by the Parties.

The CRD delivers regional, sub-regional and local services to 13 municipalities and three electoral areas on southern Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands. Governed by a 24-member Board of Directors, the CRD works collaboratively with First Nations and government partners to enable sustainable growth, foster community well-being, and develop cost-effective infrastructure while continuing to provide core services to residents throughout the region. 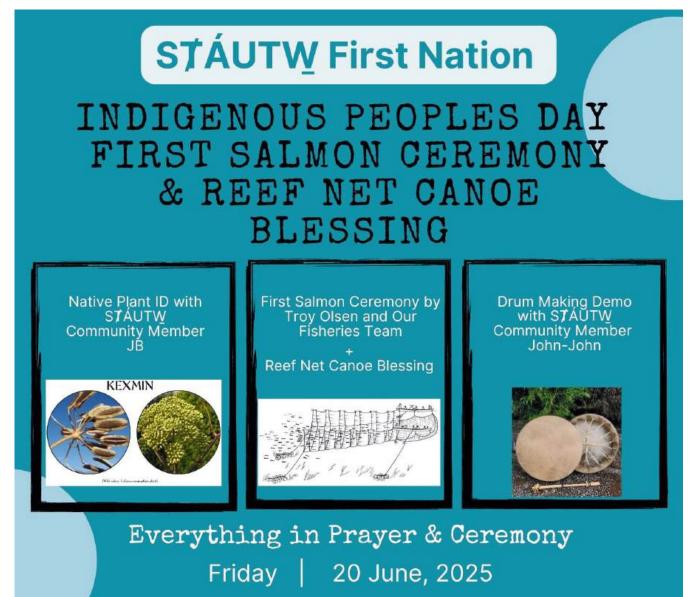

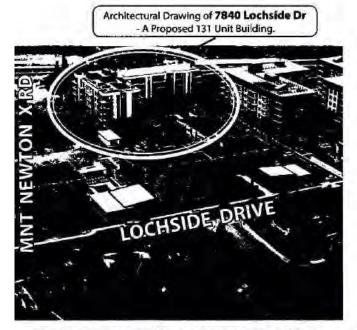

Did you know that the intersection of Mount Newton Cross Rd and Pat Bay has the 2nd highest accident rate on the Peninsula?

Are you aware that there are 7 access points to this section of Mount Newton X Road, leading to accidents and congestion?

The short left-turning lane to Pat Bay Highway, which is now often filled, results in cars blocking other lanes.

Have you noticed that this intersection is more congested since the Marigold Lands development? As many of the new units on Marigold Lands are **not yet occupied**, you will see a **huge traffic impact** very shortly as people move in.

The Tsawout lands are undergoing a *major expansion* with new homes and a residential building going in. *All traffic* will go to Mount Newton Cross Road and Lochside.



Can YOU make a difference? Yes!

Writing a letter to your Municipal Council is very effective. Our group has done a great deal of advocacy in the last two years and it has made a difference.

Several councillors have voiced significant concerns: lack of community benefit and affordability, negative implications to the community including traffic and parking. *We need to ensure that this project is defeated.*

If you oppose this, please send an email **ASAP** with your concerns to **ALL** of the Mayor and Councillors and Municipal Hall below. Council will be voting on this very soon.

Did you know that another 6 story building is proposed next to the Marigold Lands?

The approved Marigold Lands* development already has 361 units with approximately 722 people and 1000 vehicles.

The proposed 6 story rental building will add another 131 units with approximately 262 people and 300 vehicles.

That means a total estimated 1000 new residents and 1300 vehicles added to our community.

The Developer is **Starlight Investments**, with **\$30 billion of assets** under management and 70,000 residential suites. (Source: Company website)

* Marigold Lands is the development on Lochside Drive, with condos, townhouses & rentals.

Did you know that Central Saanich has exceeded its provincially-mandated Housing Targets?

Also, the majority of the units on Marigold Lands are not affordable housing*. A small, one-bedroom unit rents for approx. \$2,500 per month plus parking up to \$120 per month!**

Does this really address the AFFORDABLE housing crisis??

BITCOIN ATM SCAMS ALERT

WHAT IS HAPPENING?

Fraudsters are increasingly using Bitcoin ATMs to scam victims. Scammers impersonate government officials, banks, or police and pressure people to withdraw cash and deposit into a Bitcoin ATM.

HOW THE SCAM WORKS:

Spoofed call: You receive a call pretending to be from CRA, ICBC, police or a bank. Urgent threats: They claim you owe money or face arrest. Cash withdrawal: They instruct you to withdraw cash from your bank.

Bitcoin ATM deposit: They send a QR code and coach you to deposit money into their Bitcoin wallet - stealing your funds!

RED FLAGS TO WATCH OUT FOR:

- Pressure to act immediately
- Requests for payment through Bitcoin ATMs, e-transfers or gift cards
- Complex jargon or technical language

HOW TO STAY SAFE:

- Never share personal information
- Never make payments via Bitcoin ATMs
- Do your research and use only reputable cryptocurrency

HOW TO REPORT IF YOU ARE A VICTIM OF THIS SCAM:

- Contact your local police department to make a report: 250-656-3931
- Report it to your bank and/or credit card company as soon as possible. Call the
- Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre: 1-888-495-8501 to report.
- Monitor your credit score through Equifax Canada or Transunion Canada.

- Overall health

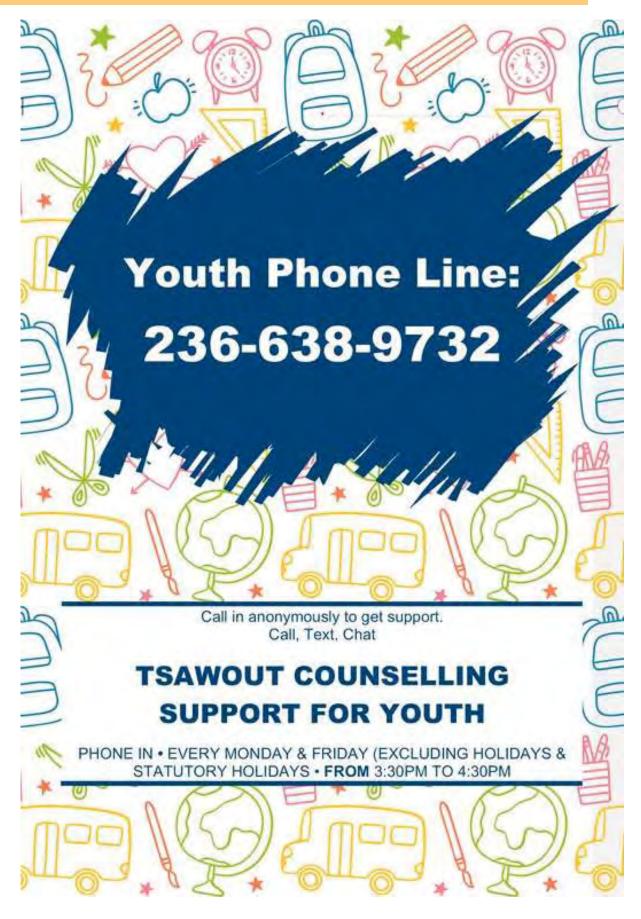

Clam Surveys at TIXEN

Community Clam Surveys Underway at 7IXEN! with Neil directing fisheries staff and two UVic Scholars supporting.

This summer, Tsawout Fisheries has launched community clam surveys to assess clam population health and conduct contaminant testing at key beach sites. These surveys are guided by the knowledge and presence of community Knowledge Holders, Elders Aaron Sam, Willard Pelkey and Allan Claxton joined us with two of his Grandchildren Oliver and Felix. It was a beautiful day! Surveys were conducted with support from Tsawout Fisheries staff and two UVic scholars who will be working throughout the summer low tides.

These efforts are part of a broader initiative to protect and better understand our vital shellfish resources. Keep your eyes and ears open during low tide—you might see the team in action!

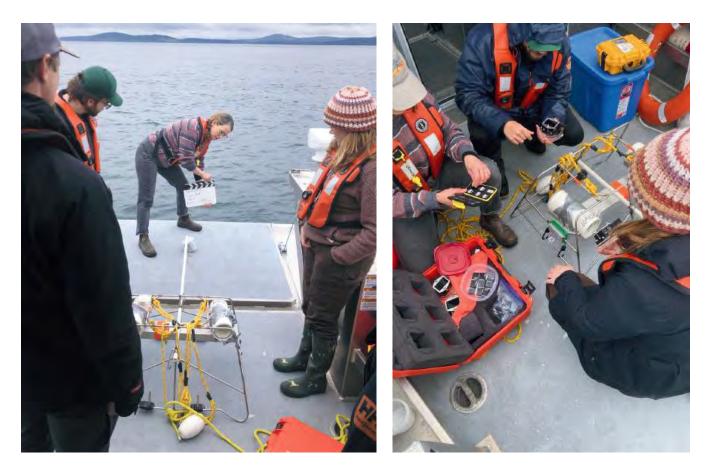

Rockfish Conservation Area Monitoring Begins!

Tsawout Fisheries has officially kicked off a new initiative to monitor Rockfish Conservation Areas (RCAs) using Baited Remote Underwater Videos (BRUVs) to assess rockfish diversity and population numbers. This cutting-edge, non-invasive method allows us to better understand the health of rockfish populations within protected zones.

A successful pilot deployment was recently carried out by the Tsawout Fisheries team in collaboration with DFO Science at Darcy Island—yes, there's an RCA down there! This marks an exciting step forward in our ongoing efforts to support sustainable fisheries and habitat protection.

Jenn Claxton from the Tsawout Fisheries Department also took the stage as a panelist, offering thoughtful insights and representing the Nation with clarity and heart.

The entire Tsawout Fisheries team was present throughout the event, making strong connections and exchanging knowledge on seaweed ecology, restoration, and sustainable use.
