# QEN,T IPCA and Seaweed Farm Boat Tour

9:30 AM

Join STÁUTW staff on a tour of our Indigenous Protected and Conserved Area (IPCA) QEN,T. We will drive past our seaweed farm that is owned and operated in partnership with Cascadia Seaweed. We will tour past our marine data collection buoy that provides critical information that supports the work carried out by STÁUTW's Fisheries Team. We will also demonstrate some of the techniques we use for ecological monitoring in QEN,T, including Dungeness crab surveys.

### TIXEN Walking Tour

Come join CASEMOT (Jennifer Claxton) for a tour of TIXEN (Cordova Spit), a sacred site that's home to sensitive ecosystems, rare plants and medicines, followed by a showcasing of our SXOLE (reef net fishing) canoe.

Then follow along with Neil Fowler and consultant Doug McCorquodale as they take you to our Salt Marsh and to learn about the monitoring and restoration efforts that are taking place to restore the natural ecological processes of this area. Throughout the tour, representatives from Guardians of Our Salish Estuaries (GOOSE) will also provide insight into the impacts associated with geese and the importance of goose management.
